REGULAR MEETING MINUTES -- MONDAY, March 13, 2023

Evening opened at 6:05 p.m. Delores Ely gave a prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Dinner was served.

A quorum of regular members is present.

Speakers: Kim Davis running for auditor was introduced. Kim is a member of the DCRW and has worked in the auditor's office since 1994. There are 100 employees she looks after and works with a thirty seven million dollar Chris Norris is running for council seat for Ward 4. Clarence Godwin is running for council seat in budget. Ward 1. He is currently on a committee that works with water/sewer and aggregation for gas and electric. He is concerned about low income housing for people 55 years and older. Delores Ely was appointed to fill a council seat vacancy in Ward 2 and is now running to be elected to this seat. She has no objection to 55 and older housing but she states 'there needs to be more research before it moves forward". She will ask questions until she gets answers. Mayor race is John Baumgardner vs Jeff Whitaker. John said, "he grew up poor and had to work for everything he has". He is a national account manager for Aeromark and plans to retire this fall. He has served three terms on city council. He is part owner of Troy Sun Shade, recently purchased old Marsh building on Martin Street, owns Dairy King, car wash across from fair grounds and owns many rentals. He stated there is definitely a drug problem to address in Greenville. Need to treat Greenville as a business not a government. Jeff Whittaker has lived in Greenville for ten years and received encouragement from many people to run for mayor. He noted Kansas City tried to remedy the drug problem by establishing a "homeless community" in a park area that totally failed. Drug problem needs to be addressed. He worked in county government in St Louis for sixteen years. He has been on Greenville city council, works with Life Wise Academy and is now retired from Whirlpool. He wants to work toward a strong, vibrant, clean community. Provide safety, clean water, good infrastructure and spend tax dollars wisely. There is a need for affordable housing to attract young working families to provide tax money to do good positive things for the community. Keep work force in town.

Programs: Lyn Bliss has not heard from Dave Yost office regarding speaker for the May meeting, but Chris Epply has volunteered if needed.


Membership: Our club has five new members.
